

When Paul Had the Opportunity

Paul was taken to be judged before the Roman procurator, Felix. False accusations were flowing against the preacher from envious, bitter Jewish leaders that resented Christianity. The Roman judge heard from the accusers.

Felix, however, was not ignorant of who Christians were (Acts 24:24), and what they were teaching. Perhaps, he had heard around the city about Christ, or how Christianity had been sweeping the countryside. He had his opinions about Christianity, and he was wise enough not to hear just the complainer's side of the story.

Then, Felix allowed Paul to speak. Instead of cowering under the authority of the man that was managing the affairs of the Romans, Paul took the opportunity to talk to the ruler about spiritual things. The preacher spoke of living a righteous life, not indulging in sin, and about the judgments God could bring.

Even though Paul's judge, as history tells us, was known for his cruelty, murders, and also considered himself licensed to commit any crime he desired, Paul did not waiver or hold back on any of the truths from the Word of God. Felix could have

easily given the word and Paul's life would have been snuffed out, but Paul boldly preached on.

The preaching did affect the procurator. Acts 24:25 records that the man trembled at what he had heard. His fear did not guide him to repent, however. He dismissed Paul and promised that they might speak again. He had the opportunity to be saved, but he put it off. Felix missed the time he could have been saved from the terrible consequences of his sins.

Many are much like Felix. They hear the convicting message from the Word of God. It cuts deeply into their hearts. Conviction of past sins floods their memories. The uneasiness of their sinful past robs them of their peace. They often have the opportunity to confess Jesus as their Saviour and to get their sins forgiven, but they put it off. "Tomorrow" or "later," they justify.

For some reason, that "another time" never comes. All too often they miss the last opportunity they had for salvation, die lost without Christ, and spend their eternity in Hell. They may have gotten "close" to being saved, but missed an eternity with Jesus. Never say "No" to God's provoking of your heart about something, especially salvation. You may never have tomorrow!

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We Are His Ambassadors

Paul, the apostle, was locked in a deep, dank dungeon for his testimony and preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. He was separated from his friends, did not get the proper food *and care, and was isolated* and forgotten, yet he



knew that God knew about his predicament and allowed him to be there for a reason. Ephesians 6:20 explains why Paul knew he was in the situation he found himself in: "*For which I am an ambassador in bonds: that therein I may speak boldly, as I ought to speak.*"

An ambassador is an important, special representative appointed to represent another power. Paul's mission in prison was to be a representative of God. As odd as many think his circumstance were, all Christians are also called to be emissaries of Heaven wherever they are. God may have them in a particular

neighborhood, situation, hospital bed, job, or school for a specific mission. He wants them to deliver his message to the people in that place. Often, no one else can reach others outside the position in which a person finds himself.

We can be ambassadors of Heaven with our lives. All are watching us in many situations, such as: how we speak, act, react

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when angry or sad, or even dress. If we do not tell others about the goodness, mercy, and grace of God, and be a testimony for Him, who will?

The Bible tells us how we can tell others. We can be an emissary by:

✿ **Singing:** Instead of the world hearing us sing their songs emphasizing adultery, drugs, sexuality, disobedience, and other ungodly actions, they should listen to us singing songs praising God's goodness and mercy.

"Sing praises to the LORD, which dwelleth in Zion: declare among the people his doings."

✿ **Talking:** Use your voice to win others to the cause of Christ.

"Sing unto him, sing psalms unto him, talk ye of all his wondrous works."

✿ **Being a good example.**

✿ **Quoting scripture and biblical principles:**

✿ **Praising Him:**

"Oh that men would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men!" *Psalms 107:8*

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others about Jesus is to give your testimony to them. Tell them what Jesus did for you. Let them know what changes He has performed in your life.

When a personal testimony is given, it:

- Shows what Jesus did to a person the listener knows. He cannot dispute that Jesus is alive and still working in one's life today when he hears what He has done in the soul-winner's life.
- Shows that the power of God is still working in lives today. It makes His workings more real to them than a story that

happened more than 2,000 years ago.

- Shows how God can transform a life. I have heard the personal testimonies of many that had a very wicked past. I could see from their standing there how different they were now. It makes Jesus' work more real when you hear it from the "horse's mouth."

Everyone should tell as many as they can how good God is and how anyone that trusts Jesus' death on the cross can be saved. The Bible commands us to do so. Often a scriptural plan with verses from God's Word about salvation can be used to tell others about the Gospel. The salvation plan and proof of God's working today can also be accomplished by telling how God has worked in your life. Tell your story today.
